

Knox College Theatre - Freedom to Flourish Come as you are Discover who you'll become



WELCOME to the first production of Knox Theatre's 2012-13 mainstage season. This year we'll be presenting one world premiere and our first ever New Plays Festival, along with the two shows of Repertory Term XVI.

We begin with a special opportunity made possible by the Joseph B. Glossberg Visiting Israeli Scholar Program. That program has brought an Israeli academic or artist to campus each year since 1995, and this year we welcome for the third time Motti Lerner, a playwright and screenwriter of international renown. Our production of At Night's End—which has not previously been fully staged in the original Hebrew or any other language—has given me and the students the rare and exciting chance to collaborate directly with a playwright on a new play. Motti has been involved in the rehearsal process from auditions to dress rehearsals, making changes to the script in response to readings by the cast, discussing ideas with the designers, and helping us all to fully understand the nuances of his play.

In winter, a group of thirty-five students will devote themselves to theatre for the whole term, forming the company for the latest iteration of Rep Term, which we've been producing at Knox since 1970. The students of Rep Term XVI will serve as actors, designers, stage managers, construction crew, and almost everything else necessary for two productions presented in repertory on the Harbach stage. Jeff Grace will direct *The* <u>Caucasian Chalk Circle</u> by Bertolt Brecht, his parable-like yet engaging exploration of law and justice, written during World War II while Brecht was living in exile in the US. Liz Carlin-Metz turns to eighteenth-century Italy: she will direct Carlo Gozzi's <u>The Green Bird</u>, a fairytale drawing on <u>commedia dell'arte</u> conventions and techniques.

In spring term we will present our New Plays Festival, featuring staged readings, workshop productions, and full stagings of original scripts written by Knox students, faculty, and alumni. (For more information, including on how to submit, visit our website: departments.knox.edu/theatre)

At Night's End is performed without an intermission

Performed by Special Arrangement with Susan Schulman: A Literary Agency 454 West 44th St. New York, N.Y. 10036 At Night's End takes place in Haifa, Israel's third largest city, in the midst of the Second Lebanon War in July and August 2006. That month-long conflict began when Hezbollah—a Shi'a Islamic militia based in Lebanon but supported financially as well as politically by Syria and Iran—ambushed an Israeli army patrol, killing several IDF (Israel Defense Forces) soldiers. Israel responded with airstrikes, blockades, and eventually a ground invasion. Hezbollah launched rockets into northern Israel. Cities in that part of the country, including Haifa, were bombed daily; more than forty civilians were killed, and hundreds of thousands evacuated.

The Battle of Bint Jbeil lasted for over two weeks beginning in late July and—like the war overall—was widely considered a humiliating failure for the Israeli military. The IDF failed to complete its objective of capturing the town of Bint Jbeil, and lost seventeen soldiers, eight of whom died during the fighting on a single day, July 26.

Many of the survivors of the Second Lebanon War returned home with horrifying stories and suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder.

FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT


Motti Lerner is the 2012-13 Joseph B. Glossberg Visiting Israeli Scholar

This is a very exciting moment for me. After writing various versions of At Night's End over a period of ten years, finally I see the full-length play receive its first full production. I'm very grateful to Neil Blackadder for producing and directing the play, and to the young actors who have been so devoted to the exploration of the script. I've learned a lot from each and every one of you. I'd also like to thank the designers who included me in the decision-making process for this production, and Knox College for enabling this wonderful team to embark on and accomplish this journey.

At Night's End is about the tragedy of one Israeli family, taking place during the 2006 war between Israel and the Hezbollah. I hope it also reflects the tragedies of many families in many countries in many wars. I hope that every audience member in every production of it will discover the unspoken consequences of the fighting for every soldier who took part in it, and that each of you will consider these consequences whenever your country is about to go to war.

Plays cannot prevent wars. But I hope that they might ignite a public discourse that will prevent them.

MOTTI LERNER



Playwright and screenwriter, born in Israel in 1949, teaches playwriting at the Kibbutz College in Tel Aviv. Most of his plays and films deal with political issues.

Among his plays are: "Kastner", "Pangs of the Messiah", "Paula", and "Pollard", all produced by the Cameri Theatre of Tel Aviv; "Exile in Jerusalem" and "Passing The Love of Women" at Habima National Theatre, "Autumn" at the Beit

Lessin Theatre, Tel Aviv, and "Hard Love" at the Municipal Theatre in Haifa. His play "The Murder of Isaac" about the assassination of Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin was produced at the Heilbron Theatre in Germany (1999) and had its American premier in Centerstage Theatre in Baltimore (2006). His play In the Dark had its world premier in Chingari Theatre Group in Delhi (2011). He has written screenplays for the films: "Loves in Betania", "The Kastner Trial", "Bus Number 300", "Egoz", the 12 episodes of the TV drama series "The Institute", "A Battle in Jerusalem", and "The Silence of the Sirens", Altalena, "Spring 1941" with Joseph Fiennes and Claire Higgins in the title roles.

He is a recipient of the best play award (1985), and the Israeli Motion Picture Academy award for the best TV drama in 1995 and in 2004. In 1994 he won the Prime Minister's of Israel Award for his creative work. His plays have been produced in the US, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, South Africa, Australia, Canada and India. His book ACCORDING TO CHEKHOV - on Chekhov's writing method - was published in 2011.

His play "Hastening the Messiah" will open in Jerusalem in February 2013, and his play "Paulus" will open in Chicago in November 2013.

He taught playwriting and screenwriting at Duke University, North Carolina 1997, Knox College, Illinois 2005, 2007, 2012 and Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi 2010.
