

WELCOME TO KNOX COLLEGE THEATRE

Welcome to the first Main Stage production of the Department of Theatre 2013-14 Harbach Season. We are pleased to celebrate with you our work in the field of theatre. Knox audiences have numbered over three thousand annually at Harbach and Studio Theatre productions ranging from the classics realism to modern and postmodern. Students who have participated in theatre productions come from across the academic disciplines, represent all four classyears, and annually number approximately 400.

Every year we seek to enlarge the classroom experience by manifesting on stage the material investigated in books and discussions, with computers and construction tools, and through critical papers and experiential work in text and performance. Each year we seek plays that are in conversation with the human experience—past, present, and future. We select for our seasons a range of plays, which, if considered over the four year tenure of a Knox student, will expose that student to a wide range of lenses with which to view the human condition. This vast canon of dramatic literature is drawn from throughout history and around the world.

Our current season examines human thought, experience, and action through three plays from the contemporary American theatre. Following last spring's inaugural New Play Festival, we have chosen to present 3 award-winning plays by American playwrights that are considered "new", as they make their way onto the professional and academic stages across the United States. In winter term, Liz Carlin-Metz will direct Sarah Ruhl's Pulitzer Prize nominated In the Next Room, or the vibrator play (2010) with its wry look at expressions of passion through the lens of Victorian perspectives on female sexuality and male ownership of female bodies. In spring term, Neil Blackadder will direct Jordan Harris' GLADD nominated Maple and Vine (2011), where going back to the 1950s suggests that nostalgia may not be all that rosy when questions of how and who we love arise. Tonight's production of Geoffrey Nauffts' Next Fall (2010) was nominated for the Tony Award, the Outer Critics Award, and a Drama Desk Award. Directed by Assistant Professor Jeff Grace, this play enters into the nation's ongoing conversations about faith, love, and commitment in the life decisions of gay and straight people, asking us to consider what it means to believe and what it costs not to. We are especially delighted that this production draws direct linkages between the stage and the classroom in that it is mounted in concert with the theatre literature course 'Gay and Lesbian Drama', also taught by Professor Grace. Faculty designers Craig Choma and Margo Shively have taken the lead positions in designing the sets, lights, and costumes for Next Fall, and have worked along side approximately 45 students to realize this production.

"ADAM FALLS AGAIN"

Adam has a big problem. Luke's faith has become a stumbling block for him. As if God were a rival lover, Adam wants Luke to choose between him and God. In the climactic moment of the play, after Adam and Luke nestle playfully on the sofa, Adam admits: "I want you to love me more than you love him." Luke has no good answer for this. No answer at all really, and so Adam announces, "I can't do this anymore," and walks out the door.

This is not the first Adam in history who has found himself in rivalry with God and then loses his happiness in the bargain. In Christian thought, when the 'first Adam' begins to suspect that God is withholding something from him, he tries to take it for himself and loses paradise. There is nothing in the play to suggest that Luke had been withholding any of his love for Adam. In fact, it is just the opposite. Luke's love is complete, both patient and kind. Adam, however, can't bring himself to believe in it. The gods of 'science' and 'success' have filled his mind with worry and a sense of inadequacy, and he is plagued by a suspicion that something is wrong. So he figures that the wrong thing must be Luke and he blames him for holding back, thereby losing love in the process.

Is this connection to the first Adam the "next fall" of the play's title? Luke does promise to come out to his family next fall. But next fall comes and goes and still Luke has not fulfilled his promise. This failure is symbolic to Adam of the distance and difference between them. But blaming Luke for being himself, for being sensitive to his family's potential inability to absorb his truth, comes very close to replicating the first Adam's blaming of Eve for his own sin.

When we approach those who love us in a spirit of rivalry, when we blame others rather than admit we are worshipping the wrong gods, we reenact the first fall. Rivalry and blame lead to the next fall and the next fall and the next one after that.

The play's greatest success is that Adam find redemption in a moment when he is able to receive a new story about himself from Luke. In that moment, he tells us, "All the doubts, everything I've been questioning for the past five years, none of it meant anything, all of a sudden. It was just me and Luke. That's all that mattered." At last, the false gods no longer compel Adam's worship and so he begins to tell a more truthful story about himself. Perhaps for Adam this fall will be his last.

Geoffrey Nauffts has worked as an actor on and Off-Broadway, regionally, and extensively in film and television.

He has directed short plays by Kenneth Lonergan, Frank Pugliese, David Marshall Grant, Theresa Rebeck, and Suzan Lori-Parks, as well as Naked Angels' critically acclaimed production of Steven Belber's *TAPE* in New York, Los Angeles, and London.

He wrote, directed, and acted in the award-winning short film

"Baby Steps," starring Kathy Bates, and co-wrote "Jenifer," a movie of the week for CBS.

He collaborated with Elton John and Anthony Barrile on a score for "Showstopper," a screenplay he and Barrile co-wrote for Ben Stiller's production company, Red Hour.

In addition to his role as a writer on ABC's hit series "Brothers and Sisters," he currently serves as artistic director for Naked Angels, where he has been a proud member for over twenty-four years.

His critically acclaimed play *NEXT FALL* opened on Broadway in March 2010, where it received the Outer Circle Critics John Gassner Award for Best New American Play, and was nominated for a Drama League Award, an Outer Circle Critics Award, a Drama Desk Award, and a Tony Award for best play.
