
THE DROWNING GIRLS: NOW AND THEN

The circumstances of the play are based on the true story of George Joseph Smith, a British bigamist, thief, and serial killer. In 1915, the details of his murderous career were widely followed in the press throughout Great Britain, as he had resided in multiple cities throughout the country. Beginning in 1896, he persuaded a series of women working in service to steal from their employers, and married and abandoned as many as four women in succession and, in at least one case, concurrently. One woman, who was arrested and convicted of theft committed at his behest, implicated him, and he also was arrested and convicted of theft, serving one year. By 1915, he bigamously married as many as seven women and absconded with all of their savings, and, in some cases sold all of their possessions. In 1915, the owner of a boarding house presented the authorities with concerns that a recently married boarder had been murdered while in the bath. Upon investigation, it was concluded that not only had Smith married and murdered the woman, he also was the perpetrator of two other murders of women, whom he had married under assumed names. In all three cases, insurance policies had been taken out on the women just prior to their deaths, and in one case he was named as the unfortunate woman's heir. In all, his proceeds from nearly 10 years of bigamy, theft, fraud, and murder netted him well over half a million dollars (in today's money). In 1915 he was arrested for the murder of Margaret Lofty, and the identical deaths of two of his wives, Alice Smith and Bessie Burnam, were presented as evidence in his trial. This was a precedent setting case, inaugurating the use of forensic evidence to establish a systematic pattern of crime. Following 20 minutes of deliberation by the jury, Smith was convicted of the murder of Margaret Lofty, and hanged in 1915.

Liz Carlin Metz (Director), Smith V. Brand Endowed Chair in Theatre Arts. Liz has directed and taught at Knox for 22 years. She teaches performance and dramatic literature and directs the program in Arts Administration. She is the founding Artistic Director of Vitalist Theatre (Chicago) and will direct a South Asian adaptation of *The Merchant ofn Venice* in Chicago for Rasaka Theatre, which will open at The Greenhouse Theatre in mid-March.
