WELCOME TO KNOX COLLEGE THEATRE

Welcome to the final production of the Knox Theatre 2017-18 season. We are delighted to announce the faculty directed plays for the 2018-19 season. Theatre productions have played a vital role in the social issues dialogues carried on at Knox since first performed in Alumni Hall in 1845 by The Knox Players and then moving to the Ford Center for the Fine Arts in 1965. Each play in the forthcoming season is a revolutionary milestone in that ongoing conversation, engaging considerations of the role that biased perception plays in defining the Other, with potentially devasting consequences.

In the fall term, we will present Before Sunrise, written by Ewald Palmetshofer and translated and directed by Neil Blackadder. This production will mark the college world premiere of Blackadder's own translation from German of the latest play by the acclaimed Austrian playwright, based on the groundbreaking 1889 Naturalist drama by Gerhart Hauptmann. The play is a family drama revolving around the reunion of two men who were good friends

at university, but who since then have taken very different paths.

In winter term, we celebrate Repertory Term XVIII in which Jeff Grace will direct in Studio Theatre The Laramie Project by Moisés Kaufman and members of the Tectonic Theater Project. Based on events surrounding the 1998 murder of Matthew Shepard, this play helped pioneer a new theatre genre - verbatim theatre - in which the text is composed entirely from the words of the citizens of Laramie, Wyoming. The result is a compassionate and complex portrait of a town

shocked by an inexplicably brutal act of hatred.

Liz Carlin Metz will direct in Harbach Theatre the second Repertory Term play, the American classic, The Children's Hour by Lillian Hellman. Written in the 1930s, a devastating and false accusation of what was termed "sexual deviance" sets in motion a seething interrogation of social perceptions that determine the fates of two women running a boarding school. Though a landmark in its day, the play is a problem play by today's standards, as similar to post-Victorian views of mental illness, congenital cognitive anomalies, and cancer, all of which were viewed as contagious and feared as retribution for sin, lesbianism was deemed a mental disorder in a culture in which women were meant to be virgins or wives.

Spring term marks the third New Plays Festival in which new plays written by Knox students, faculty, and alumni will be performed in stage readings. Seven weekends will be devoted to original works directed and performed by

students.

Faculty designers Craig Choma and Margo Shively will again take the lead positions in designing the sets, lights, and costumes working along side student designers and production teams. Students who participate in theatre productions routinely come from across the academic disciplines, represent all four class-years, and annually number approximately 400. Every year we seek to expand the classroom experience by manifesting on stage the material investigated in books and discussions, and with computers and construction tools. Each year we seek plays from the historical worldwide canon of dramatic literature that are in conversation with the human experience - past, present, and future. We select for our seasons a range of plays, which, if considered over the four year tenure of a Knox student, will expose that student to a wide range of lenses with which to view the world. We are pleased to celebrate with you our work in the field of theatre, and our shared examinations of what it means to be human.

PAUL BOWLES (Sound Designer) was an American expatriate composer, author, and translator. He pursued his education at the University of Virginia before making various trips to Paris in the 1930s. He studied music with Aaron Copland, and in New York wrote music for various theatrical productions. In addition to his chamber and stage compositions, he published fourteen short story collections, three volumes of poetry, numerous translations, and an autobiography. He achieved critical and popular success with the publication in 1949 of his first novel The Sheltering Sky. In 1947, Bowles settled in Tangier, Morocco. Except for winters spent in Sri Lanka (then known as Ceylon) during the early 1950s, Tangier was his home for the remainder of his life. He composed the original score for The Glass Menagerie on Broadway, which is being used in Knox's production courtesy of Dramatists Play Service, Inc.*

TENNESSEE WILLIAMS



TENNESSEE WILLIAMS was born Thomas Lanier Williams in Columbus, Mississippi in 1911. His first play Cairo! Shanahai! Bombay! was produced in 1935 by the Memphis Garden Players. Several more short plays were produced in St. Louis the following year, and in 1937 Williams transferred to the University of Iowa where he enrolled in E.P. Conkle's and E.C. Mabie's famous playwriting classes. That same year his sister underwent a prefrontal lobotomy for her schizophrenic episodes and was later placed in a sanatorium; this incident would haunt Williams for the rest of his life.

In 1938, inspired by a newspaper article that described rioting

and prison torture in a Philadelphia County prison, Williams wrote his fourth full-length play: Not About Nightingales. At the end of 1938, Williams moved to the French Quarter section of New Orleans, where in the Vieux Carré at 722 Toulous Street, he underwent a personal and artistic transformation by changing his name from "Tom" to "Tennessee," a change he would chronicle decades later in the play Vieux Carré (1977). After the 1940 opening of his Battle of Angels in Boston (later reworked as Orpheus Descending), Williams tried his hand in Hollywood writing screenplays: however, he would not enjoy critical success for several years. His first success, The Glass Menagerie (1945) was followed by the 1947 Broadway opening of A Streetcar Named Desire, which garnered Williams his first Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Success followed upon success with Summer and Smoke (1948), The Rose Tattoo (1951), Camino Real (1953), Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (1955, Pulitzer Prize), Orpheus Descending (1957), Suddenly Last Summer (1958), Sweet Bird of Youth (1959), Night of the Iguana (1961), The Milk Train Doesn't Stop Here Anymore (1963), The Seven Descents of Myrtle (1968), In the Bar of a Tokyo Hotel (1969), Small Craft Warnings (1972), Vieux Carré (1977), A Lovely Sunday for Creve Coeur (1979), and Something Cloudy, Something Clear (1981).

aving received two Pulitzer Prizes, four New York Critics Circle Awards, the National Arts Club Medal of Honor for Literature, and countless other awards, Williams died in 1983 at the age of 71. He left behind living shadows of himself: characters with immortality that continue to entertain, enlighten, and challenge our perceptions of humanity.
