What Was Wilde

Doing?

The Importance of Being Earnest is Oscar Wilde's best known play and a largely undisputed stage classic. Since the play's debut in 1895, however, critics and scholars have struggled to definitively place it within a single genre. It is most often called a comedy of

manners, or a farce, sometimes even a parody or satire. All of these labels fit certain aspects of the play, but fall short in important ways.

A farce is a comedy that aims to entertain an audience through situations that are highly exaggerated, extravagant, and thus, improbable. Plots are often incomprehensible. Farces are further characterized by physical humor, deliberate absurdity, and broadly stylized performance. Earnest, however, is no ordinary farcical play, in part because it is simply too clever to be just a farce. Yes, it meets much of the criteria and even makes use of farcical situations, but in the end the play is just too clever. The comedy, for the most part, comes not from action or situation, but from the dialogue. The dialogue, moreover, makes abundant use of Oscar Wilde's famous wit— a comic effect far more subtle and intellectual than in a purely farcical play.

If Earnest is not a true farce, maybe it fits better as a comedy of manners? A comedy of manners presents a fundamentally realistic world; though they may be exaggerated, any minor weakness or eccentricity of the characters is made comedic as a representation of real excesses. Earnest does not quite fit this genre either, the world is much too extra-rational. Wilde created a world which inverts 'real' values, switches up reason and unreason. Odd though it may seem to say, Earnest is too real to be a farce, but not real enough to be a comedy of manners.

Is Earnest closer to a satire of late Victorian society? There is certainly a strong current of social criticism running through the play. Jack, a paradoxical symbol of Victorian hypocrisy as a man who is neither earnest nor. Earnest and yet both, and Lady Bracknell's snobbery is constantly the butt of Wilde's jokes. Or is the play best defined as a parody of the popular romantic fiction of the day? Jack and Algernon are presented as clever, worldly young men typical of the time, but are actually fussy and incredibly sentimental. Gwendolen and Cecily would seem to be the archetypal proper young ladies, but are really incredible schemers who manipulate the men like chess pieces.

So, what is The Importance of Being Earnest? Into which category does it fit? People just can't agree. But then, audiences never really seem to mind.
