

DIRECTOR'S NOTES



Anton Chekhov & Olga Knipper

The four plays written by Anton Chekhov in the last decade of his truncated life are among the most highly regarded of all dramatic works. Somehow, in writing this series of dramas set in provincial Russia at the turn of the twentieth century, Chekhov succeeded in depicting truths about how human beings live their lives that resonate for people in vastly different places and periods. He did so by drawing on yet breaking with the established methods of dramatic writing in the late nineteenth century. Unlike in the plays of Ibsen, for instance, in which the dramatic action revolves around revelations and reversals that occur on stage, Chekhov often has the major, life-changing events happen not only off stage, but in between the acts. As he describes his own approach, "People eat their dinner, just eat their dinner, and all the time their happiness is taking form, or their lives are being destroyed."

We are presenting one of those plays, *Three Sisters*, in a production to which many students—far more than just those you will see on stage—have contributed a great deal. I granted my two assistant directors a very active role in the rehearsal process; frequently, while I was working on one scene with several actors, they would each be in a different space rehearsing other passages involving one or two characters. The assistant lighting designer assumed a similar level of responsibility, and the costume designer is a post-bac student. Among the many others, I'd like to single out the team of stage managers, the unsung heroes of the theatre, who come to every rehearsal, arriving early and leaving late, and without whom a production like this could never come into being.

When *Three Sisters* was first produced in Moscow in 1901, Russians referred to attending a performance of the play as "paying a call on the Prozorovs." We hope you'll enjoy the evening you will spend visiting the Prozorovs.

Chekhov was born into a poor family in the southern port of Taganrog. The third of six children, he spent his childhood working in the grocery store and singing in the church choir. In 1876, his father went bankrupt and fled their rural home for Moscow. Chekhov alone remained in Taganrog, to finish high school. He came to Moscow in 1879 and enrolled in medical school. While studying medicine he also began to publish short stories, first in magazines then in collections of his own work. He was diagnosed with pulmonary tuberculosis in 1884; two decades later he would die from the disease. Having established himself as a fiction writer, Chekhov began to write plays, with mixed results: in 1889, the reception of the revised version of his Ivanov was favorable, but 1896 The Seagull was greeted with devastating hostility. Thanks in part to the productions of Stanislavsky's Moscow Art Theatre, Chekhov's four major plays were successfully produced between 1898 and 1904. Three Sisters premiered at the MAT in 1901, with Masha played by Olga Knipper, whom Chekhov married some months later. He died in 1904, half a year after the premiere of The Cherry Orchard.
