GRACE (Director) Associate Professor of Theatre at Knox College. He received both his M.S. in Education (2004) and his Ph.D. in Theatre History, Theory, and Literature (2008)from University. Jeff's work as a director has been seen on stages at Knox College, Indiana University, Brigham Young University, Brighton High Productions, UHSAA Jordan District, and Street Theatre lab. Recent directing credits include The Wolves, Dear Elizabeth, Mrs. Harrison, A Doll's House Part 2. The Laramie Project, The Glass Menagerie, The Nether, The Secret in the Wings, Rapture Blister Burn, The Caffe Cino Project, Next Fall, The Caucasian Chalk Circle, Under Construction, Euripides' Medea, The Serpent, This is Your Song, Chess, The World Goes 'Round, Grease!, Pippin, Once on This Island, George Orwell's 1984. Cagebirds, Up the Down Staircase, The Diviners, Doors, 27 Wagons Full of Cotton, and Act Without Words. Jeff is excited to present The Coast Starlight at Knox, and he is thankful to such a wonderful cast for all their hard work. He would especially like to thank his husband, Zack, for the unwavering love, support, and patience through the many hours away from home. leff is originally from Pleasant Grove, Utah.

CRAIG CHOMA (Scenic Designer, Lighting Designer, Projection Designer) is an Associate Professor of Theatre and Knox Theatre's resident designer and technical director. Favorite Knox designs

Craig has designed both sets and/or lights professionally in Chicago, Milwaukee, New Orleans, Minneapolis, Ohio, Toronto, Canada, and Avignon, France. Craig designs for both theatre and dance, and he both equally. He designed in proscenium, thrust, and spaces, small storefront theaters, converted churches and libraries, and site-specific locations. been the production designer for a number of fundraising events, and he has collaborated on court cases, creating forensic models used in the presentation evidence. Craig holds a B.A. Theatre and Philosophy from Knox College (1993), and M.F.A.'s in both Scenic and Lighting Design from Carnegie Mellon University (1996). Craig is originally from Chicago, Illinois.

ALLISON SMITH HAHN (Costume Designer) is an instructor, resident costume designer, and costume studio manager. She received her B.A. from Knox, studying under the

mentorship of Margo Shively and serving Post-Baccalaureate as a Fellow in the Studio. KEITH BUNIN



Keith Bunin is the author of *The Coast Starlight*, which was commissioned and first produced by La Jolla Playhouse in 2019, and received its New York City premiere in 2023 at Lincoln Center Theater.

Keith was born in Poughkeepsie, New York. He attended film school at New York University, and then graduated with a B.A. from Goddard College. He later received a master's degree from Columbia University.

His plays *The Credeaux Canvas* (2002), *The World Over* (2002), and *The Busy World Is Hushed* (2006) all premiered Off-Broadway at Playwrights Horizons. His other plays include *The Unbuilt City* (New York Stage and Film), *Sam Bendrix at the Bon Soir* (La Jolla Playhouse / City Theater Pittsburgh, 2012), *Vera Laughed* (New World Stages and Film), *The Principality of Sorrows* (Pure Orange Productions, 2009), *The King of Clocks* (Lincoln Center Lab), and *A Joke* (Malaparte Theatre Company). He also wrote the book for the musical *10 Million Miles* (Atlantic Theater Company, 2007). Keith also has a few essays published in American Film Magazine and on the web at McSweeney's Internet Tendency.

His screenwriting credits include working for Universal Pictures, Paramount Pictures, CBS Films, Fox Animation, and Likely Story/Mandalay Films, among others. He wrote the screenplay for the film *Horns* (2013), which was directed by Alexandre Aja, starring Daniel Radcliffe, and was based on the novel by Joe Hill. He co-wrote Disney/Pixar's *Onward* (2020) along with Dan Scanlon and Jason Headley, and he shares story credit on Netflix's *Nimona* (2023). He recently adapted Steve Almond's and Julianna Baggott's novel *Which Brings Me to You* (2024) for film. Keith was also a writer for the HBO TV series *In Treatment* (2009).

"It's a journey of what could be ... and what might have been."

Do you ever think about the strangers around you, and how your world could change with a simple "hello"? Playwright Keith Bunin explains how he used this idea as inspiration to write his most recent play *The Coast Starlight*. He says:

It's a play about a young man who gets on a train without knowing where he's going or what he's going to do once he gets there. He's a navy medic who has been stationed at Camp Pendleton, and he is in the process of making a big and potentially dangerous decision in his life – and that's sort of the literal story of the play. When I was living out in California for a writing job, I was doing a lot of traveling up and down the west coast, and I discovered there was this train called the Coast Starlight that went from L.A. to Seattle everyday, a 36 hour train ride, so about a day and a half. I decided to take that train a bunch of times. I discovered that part of the experience of living in a city where you don't know many people, and you're traveling a lot, is realizing that you're alone ...a lot. But also, realizing that you're alone 'in public' a lot. The lives of the people that you're in close proximity with —even if you don't talk to them or you are only able to say very simple things to them— well, they become a real part of your life.

I wanted to write a play in which the imagined conversations or the fantasies people have about each other are given theatrical life because I think that's kind of how we live our lives most of the time. I think one of the great things about writing a play [as opposed to a film] is that you can take something that is kind of an internal state, that might feel like it's the way we think about things, and you can make it three dimensional on stage. So 'The Coast Starlight' is my way of physicalizing the effect we all have on each other when we are together in the same space, even if we don't know we are having it.
